Secretary's Report Sam McCurdy



This year, I had the privilege to serve a second term as Secretary of the Rotary Club of Berwick and the Rotary Berwick & District Benevolent Society, under President David Button's leadership.

The COV-19 Pandemic continued to create problems during the year with intermittent lockdowns and health precautions leading to periods of online rather than the normal face-to face Club meetings. Of course, the online arrangement did not suit everyone resulting in a drop-off in attendance. However, ours was not the only Club in the District experiencing this problem.

We were successful in gaining an Equipment Grant from the City of Casey that enabled us to purchase a better microphone and a camera for use in ZOOM meetings, thereby improving the online communication experience.

As Incorporated Associations, the Club and the Benevolent Society continued to meet the requirements of the Australian Charity and Not-for-profit Commission (ACNC) and Consumer Affairs Victoria (CAV) by conducting Annual General Meetings and lodging our Annual Statements. After some initial bureaucratic difficulties, we also succeeded in registering the Rotary Club as a 'Fundraiser' with CAV. Therefore, the Club and the Benevolent Society are now registered 'Fundraisers'.

Working together with Graham Johnstone, our Club Protection Officer, two new policies/procedures were endorsed covering COVID Management and BBQ Management.

We updated our Club badges this year to reflect the current Rotary branding, and these have been distributed to those members who have attended face-to-face meetings. Efforts are now being made to update our Club polo shirts with the correct branding through a shirt amnesty.

As well as the normal secretarial work, I have been able to contribute to a variety of local projects, including Mock Interviews of Year-II students at Nossal High School (NHS), operating the BBQ to provide sausages to over 1,000 people at the NHS Sports Day, Art Screen hire, Clean-up Australia Day, Berwick College's Presentation Balls, and the Christmas Appeal.

In addition, I participated in the 'Walk to End Polio' and the Mother's Day Classic, raising much needed funds for research.

After a 3-year term, I ended my role as the Club's community representative on the Nossal High School Council and arranged for Andrew Somers to take over as my successor. I wish Andrew well in this role and hope that he finds it as stimulating and informative as I did.

I added relevant documents to the ClubRunner archive to facilitate ready access by members, when required. These documents include the Club's Rules and By Laws, monthly reports, and minutes of Board meetings, as well as policies and procedures.

I have continued to contribute regular articles to the Club's bulletin, 'Spoke N Word' and hopefully they have provided topical news on the Club and Rotary's wider activities.

Rotary Berwick & District Benevolent Society:

The Benevolent Society is a project of the Rotary Club. It is a registered charity with the ACNC and has Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status. Early in the year, the ACNC requested that we amend the Rules for the Society to include a DGR revocation clause 76(5). This was approved via a Special General Meeting and is now incorporated within the Rules.

The Benevolent Society works closely with Casey North Community Information Support Service (CNCISS) in Narre Warren and PP Gus Dominguez has continued as our Club representative on their Board of Management this year.

Historically, the Benevolent Society has gained its funds from donations, notably from the Dandenong Magistrate's Court and until recently from donations from the congregation of Cardinia Presbyterian Church. Unfortunately, the Church closed, and the main source of funds is now the Magistrate' Court, with a small amount donated via a coin collection box at Coles Supermarket in central Berwick.

Each year the Benevolent Society runs a Christmas Appeal. This involves working with eight local schools and two Supermarket sites to collect non-perishable foods, toys, and books donated by the public. In addition, we collected two car loads of toys produced and donated by the Berwick Wood Workers Club. All these donations were delivered to CNCISS who sorted them into Christmas hampers for distribution to those in need within the local community.

The 2021 Christmas Appeal was very successful, thanks to the generous donations by the public through the eight schools, two Supermarkets and the Berwick Wood Workers Club. It was all possible due to the efforts of the small collection team of Rotarians made up of Laury Gordyn, Russell Fellows, Andrew Somers, Andy Merrill, David Anderson, Gus Dominguez, Eric Boon and me. Thanks also go to the staff of CNCISS who work tirelessly with the local community.

Finally I would like to thank President David for giving me the opportunity to be Club Secretary for a second year in succession (3rd time overall) and the 2021-2022 Board members for their support and good humour throughout the year







International and Foundation Report PDG Tim Moore



As mentioned by many others, the work we could do in 2021-21 has still been affected by Covid and its limits on fund raising activities and projects.

After many years of reporting our Global Grant in the Philippines – Clean Water for 6 villages, has been completed and is in the final stages of presenting its final report to the Rotary Foundation. It is a testament to our partner club that they were able to continue through ISIS training and fighting in the first area chosen (which meant another 6 villages had to be assessed and approved) and, of course, Covid 19.

The result is amazing and now 6000 villages have access to clean water and improved hygiene and sanitation practices provided by the RC of Berwick's funding some time ago.

The RC of Cayagan De Oro have sent us a video of the local's appreciation for our joint work. This has been shown to the club members and illustrates how our donation of \$14000 was supported by our District's Designated Foundation fund which was then overall matched by the Rotary Foundation to a value of \$40000 Australian dollars.

We also thank the partnership of Disaster Aid Australia, Rotary Club of Greater Dandenong and Endeavour Hills, the Sky Juice Foundation and the Balay Mindanau Foundation. We look forward to being involved, where possible, in supporting these worthy causes again.

The Rotary Club of Berwick has always been a strong Foundation giver, and this continues to be the case. Many of our members also support Rotary's own charity, the Rotary Foundation, personally. Some doiby regular giving monthly, others via the Centurion Club, where a tax deductible \$100 Australian per year is given.

Over time these donations, besides doing great work in Australia and the world, earn points that go towards a Paul Harris recognition for the donor.

The Rotary Club of Berwick, via its regular donations to the Rotary Foundation, accrue points and members are encouraged to recommend to the Paul Harris Fellow committee, members of the club or the community that can be presented with the recognition for their service or community work. Such a public presentation can help raise our profile and the work of the club in the community.

This year our club will make a number of these worthy recognitions.

May I also thank Jane Moore for organising and promoting the End Polio Fund Raising movie night on the 19th March. Several clubs joined us and raised a considerable sum for the Rotary Foundation's main program to End Polio in the world. A project that has been going for over 25 years. I know this will be reported under the public image section.

We look forward to the Covid fog clearing that will allow our club to reconnect with many of the International and Foundation programs of Rotary into the future.

Membership Report David Anderson



I want to start this report by telling a story of how I was feeling and what I was thinking when I offered to join the board in the Membership chair just a few short months after joining Rotary.

Becoming a Rotarian in my retirement meant that I could fulfil a couple of goals that I set myself, namely be involved in the community through volunteer work and building an ever expanding social network.

When I was accepted as Membership Chair I started working up a strategy to both increase the membership base of the club as well as increase the engagement of existing members. I also did a deep dive into the club demographics and frankly what I saw really started to worry me. It was clear that the club had an aging demographic, that 65% of the club's membership had a tenure of 10 years plus and was somewhat under represented by females. In summary, we needed some new members and we also needed to mirror as a club what our local community looked like, so that we were very relevant and accessible.

The other condition that existed is that we were still experiencing Covid 19 restrictions and were basically involved in nothing, simply existing over zoom.

When I look back I remember at times feeling a little overwhelmed, very worried about what I needed to do, scared about the outcome for the club if I failed in my resolve, but also energised by the fact that together as a club we could also get this very right.

So back to the strategy. It was quite simple in my mind and somewhat foundational and in simple terms it was:

- Start doing things again
- Become visible whilst doing things
- Ensure meetings are fun, interactive and educational
- Begin to share the club's value proposition as often as possible
- Invite people to join us



Activity wise we are gaining real momentum and our club members have been very busy with the following projects:

- Art Screen Hire
- Charity Movie Night
- Playground re-purposing
- Mother's Day Walk
- Mock Interviews at Nossal High
- Christmas goods collection and delivery
- Berwick Secondary College Debutante Balls
- Berwick Cemetery Clean-up project
- Clean up Australia Day



As I write this it is also great to mention that we also broke out the club BBQ last Wednesday and cooked for around 1000 folk at Nossal High School sports day at Casey Fields. We have been sharing what we have been doing via social media which is helping let the community know we are up and about.

So what does this mean for membership you ask? Our club is more attractive to like-minded prospective members when they can experience and see the things we do that they might also be involved in.

Add to this increased activity the broad range of interesting guest speakers who have presented to us at our weekly meetings, the Travel Guide nights set up by Di Double designed to grab our attention and invite family and friends along to and the strategy is starting to look like it is being executed.

We are now well positioned to start inviting people to become part of the Rotary Club of Berwick family, and in fact we started to do that at the Debutante Balls held a couple of weeks ago where we had flyers on all tables telling our story including the basic fact that our involvement with the Debutante Balls is 37 years. What's next?

We need to stay close to the strategy, stay busy with meaningful projects, have fun, tell as many people as we can about what impact we are having and the contribution the club makes and always look for ways to bring more people into this club. I think we are now very well placed to start inviting and encouraging people to join Rotary Club of Berwick.

We're well on the way and I know that because I received a text message last Friday from a club member inviting me, as well as others to a lunch. That message meant a lot to me as it tells me that our activity is up and our fellowship is strengthening.

Social media:




The project team organising the plaque for the Mick Morland memorial seat sought advice on correct compliant branding for the brass plaque.

Support for Local School Student Awards

Pre-Paid Gift Card Cash Vouchers were donated by Berwick Rotary Club and were delivered in December 2021 to Harkaway Primary School, Berwick Secondary College and Brentwood Primary School for their end of year student award nights for achievement and leadership.

Model of United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

MUNA Awards were conducted via ZOOM on Sunday 17/10/211. 8 Awards were presented. All video submissions were extended until 17/9/21 due to technical issues. Each team were required to produce a 5-minute video in response to an adapted United Nations resolution - Protection of global climate for present and future generations of humankind. Countries represented were Turkey, Canada, USA and Saudi Arabia. Berwick Rotary Club supported two of the St Margaret's Berwick Grammar delegations. The MUNA overall winner this year was Mary McKillop representing Colombia.

The St Margaret's Berwick Grammar Interact Club were also impacted by COVID this year but were able to deliver on various initiatives. On IDAHOBIT Day (International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia, Intersexism and Transphobia), the club visited both senior campuses and painted the faces of students and teachers with the pride flag, educating and spreading awareness in regards to the discrimination that many young people face. In addition to this, they put up many posters and created a large book display in the library in ally ship of the LGBTQIA+ community. This tied in nicely with The Crane Project, which started in 2020. Due to the many lockdowns, all activities planned to do with the origami paper planes were postponed. The project was created to follow the Japanese belief that the folder of 1000 origami paper cranes would be granted one wish, in which our wish was for equality and equity for all. The cranes were displayed in the school auditorium, and accompanied an activity conducted by the St Margaret's Senior Campus. Currently, they have 63 people signed up to complete the challenge, and 10 different teams competing against each other to keep morale and for a bit of competition.
